Creators of all used artifacts are cited in Section 3 (Representations) and Appendix A.1, with references to the original papers and model repositories.

The paper uses pretrained models and datasets strictly under their original research-use terms. Licensing details are governed by the original providers and are not restated in the paper.

Consistency with intended use is discussed in Section 3 and the Ethical Statement, where all pretrained models and datasets are used strictly for non-commercial research and evaluation purposes.

Data anonymization, privacy protection, and the absence of personally identifying information are discussed in the Ethical Statement section.

Dataset characteristics, task design, and demographic information are documented in Section 5 (Experiments) and Appendix A.2.

Dataset size, subject counts, task descriptions, and cross-validation protocol are reported in Section 5 and Appendix A.2.
- C. Did you run computational experiments?**

Model size, parameter counts, training setup, and computing infrastructure are reported in Appendix A.4.

Experimental setup and fixed hyperparameter values are described in Section 5 (Training Details) and Appendix A.4.

Results are reported as averages over five-fold cross-validation and multiple random seeds, with statistical significance testing described in Section 5.

Preprocessing tools and packages (e.g., OpenFace, librosa) and their usage are described in Appendix A.3.

The study uses an existing clinical dataset; participant instructions were part of the original data collection protocol and are outside the scope of this work.

Participant recruitment and compensation were handled by the original dataset creators and are documented in the original dataset publication.
