The paper uses public datasets and data from prior work, but it does not provide a dedicated discussion of procedures for checking personally identifying information or offensive content, nor of anonymization/protection steps.

We report point-estimate F1 scores in tables, but do not provide error bars, variance across runs, or an explicit statement that results are averaged over multiple runs.

The Responsible NLP Checklist used at ACL Rolling Review is adopted from NAACL 2022, with the addition of ACL 2023 question on AI writing assistance and further refinements based on ARR practice. ACL 2026 used a subset of ARR checklist form.
